Via Rail Press Release

Between July 1 and August 14, 2010 active or retired Canadian Forces personnel and veterans will be entitled to free Economy class rail travel on selected trains across the entire VIA network. In addition CF personnel and Veterans will be eligible for a 25% discount off the best available fares for both Business and Sleeper class. Each active or retired CF member may also bring up to five immediate family members with them at a 25% discount off the best available fare in any class of service. The CF Family appreciation fare can also be combined with VIA’s children’s summer travel discount.

Bravo Zulu The term “Bravo Zulu” originates from the Allied Signals Book. Signals are sent as letters and/or numbers, which have meanings by themselves sometimes or in certain combinations. A single table in ATP1 is called “governing groups”, that is, the entire signal that follows the governing group is to be performed according to the “governor”. The letter “B” indicates this table, and the second letter (A through Z) gives more specific information. For example, “BA” might mean “You have permission to.....(do whatever the rest of the flashing light, flag holist or radio transmission says) “BZ” happens to be the last item in the governing groups table. It means “well done”. I guess the only guys who understand this are Sigs, radiomen, or radiomen specialists eh Ed?

Three Sheets to the Wind.
